While Nicholas of Cusa's work has historically been viewed through the lens of Platonism or anti-Aristotelian criticism, his engagement with the intellectual exchanges surrounding the Plato-Aristotle controversy of the 15th century has remained largely unexplored. This **conference** captures this crucial yet often overlooked aspect of Cusa's thought by mapping the networks of manuscript circulation, personal relationships and philosophical allegiances that informed Cusa's comparative analysis of Plato and Aristotle.

The conference is part of the ***manicula* project** (<https://manicula.uni-siegen.de>), based at the University of Siegen and funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG). The project examines the corpus of Platonic and Aristotelian manuscripts possessed and read by Nicholas of Cusa. The aim of the project is to produce a critical edition of Cusa's glosses and marginal notes to the Latin translations of Plato and Aristotle, and to investigate Cusa's reading practices in the broader context of the 15th-century reception of Plato and Aristotle.
